The Africa Power Caucus

Leading players in the African power sector discuss themes arising from the forum, and the merits of the various models. All are agreed that massive expansion is required. How to achieve this and at what cost is debatable.

State utilities have a responsibility to provide affordable electricity. Adherents maintain that by maximising efficiency they can deliver at a lower cost than the private sector—not being hampered by expensive financing, and private shareholders. Nothing per se prevents a state utility from operating with commercial rigour.

The contracting of outside managers has been adopted by a number of state utilities as a solution to poor internal management.

Management contracts are often adopted in the wake of a bungled privatization. But how effective are they for the long-term development of the power sector?

Privatization is a loaded term. Its connotations depend on which side of the fence the observer stands; consequently, many find it easier to sit on the fence. Privatization is not a short-term solution to mismanagement; it can be a long-term goal for the industry's growth and the delivery of efficient, Affordable services. But

successful privatization requires preconditions. Given the uniqueness of the African situation, blueprints for success are absent, although there is a clearer understanding of the prerequisites.

Financing of public utilities is no longer confined to governments and concessionary funders. The growing importance of other sources of funding, including private, will have a bearing on how the industry is structured.
